## SPORTS NOTES

November 7 marked the first Davis-Fegan Cup Annual Gridiron Classic between Prep and Landon. This new annual matchup honors two outstanding coaches, Landon's Lowell Davis and Prep's Jim Fegan. Both men, whose combined service as coaches spans 66 years, have been inducted into the Maryland State Football Hall of Fame.

A ceremony honoring Davis and Fegan was held before the game at Triplett Field. The inaugural game of this annual competition took place during Landon's Homecoming and ended with a 23-16 win for Prep.
